Varsity Boys Basketball

The Varsity Boys Basketball team had one of the best seasons ever in Tully school history. The team made an improbable run through the sectional playoffs and all the way to the State Final four. The team eventually lost in the State Semi-Finals to a team out of Rochester, but the experience is something that each player will never forget.

The Playoff run began with a series of wins in the Sectional Tournament, highlighted by beating Weedsport in the sectional semi-finals and finally defeating Cooperstown in the Sectional Championship game, at the Carrier Dome. With the win over



Cooperstown, which was a rematch with the same team that Tully had faced in the previous two Sectional Finals, the team captured the schools 4th sectional title in the last 15 years. The sectional win was highlighted by a fire department led parade through the town of Tully.

After winning the Section 3 Class C title, the Varsity boys advanced to the State Regional tournament where they met Unadilla Valley. A great second half effort, led the team to victory and they moved on to the State Final four. This year's team was led by a great group of seniors, captains Thomas Morse, Dante Cuttino, and Joe Crawford. Evan Rapp, Matt Kamakaris, Colum Swan and Kaden Averill finished out their senior season on one of the most successful Tully basketball teams in school history. The junior class will have a lot to look forward to next year, led by cousins, Tyler and Jake Edinger, as well as Tim Kamakaris, Garrett Fox, Josh Prince, Andrew Schaber and Sam Stoogenke.

The Tully team and coaching staff would like to sincerely thank the parents, family, friends and community members that supported the team along the tournament run. Without their support along the way it would have not been as magical.





Broad-band arriving to more rural routes

At the town board meeting, Onondaga County Legislator, David Knapp advised the town of appropriation of funds for running high speed internet to some existing rural routes in Tully. This is above and beyond what Spectrum is running in the county, per their agreement to satisfy their merger with Time Warner.

New lines will be run by Clarity Fiber Solutions, Hughes Network Systems, LLC and Verizon. This program is funded in part by a state grant and private funding.

Tully High School Alumni News

The Tully Alumni Association was organized in 1897 with the intent to gather annually and to maintain a Directory. The first Alumni Banquet was held in 1898 at the Hotel Slayton. Up until the 1940's the annual banquet was held at various restaurants or civic club locations in the area. Then until the late 1970's the event was held at the High School. There was about a ten-year period when there was no annual event. In the 1990's a 1937 Alumnus, Nellie Gordon, who was also a retired school secretary at Tully, got together with a few others and re-organized the annual get-together. The directory continues to be updated and printed annually.

This year's Alumni Event will be Saturday, August 18th at Orchard Vali Golf Club at Noon. All classes are encouraged to attend.
