Message from Supervisor 9/2022

I would like to take this opportunity to thank Nancy Chawgo, our Town Historian, and all the volunteers for making our Tully Community Day a great success. It was a great day and a great opportunity to see all our friends and neighbors.

I also want to give a quick update on the "Tully Valley water project." Although, we are behind on actual construction (due to "supply chain" and current material costs), progress is being made in the planning and layout. At this point, we are hoping for construction to start next spring.

For much of the summer, the access to the public kitchen and restrooms, proximal to the Town Pavilion, have had limited access. This is due to vandalism that occurred earlier in the year. We have now procured quotes and authorized the installation of the infrastructure that will support security cameras outside the restroom area. This will allow greater access to the public.

Earlier in the year, we realized that some of our security alarm systems that support personnel at the Town Hall were not fully operable. We have now completed the quoting process and authorized the upgrade of this system.

Tully has participated in the NYSERDA Clean Energy Community Program. Tully has procured a \$5000 grant to be used for any energy conservation project. We are currently reviewing ideas for the best utilization of these funds.

I want to inform you that the Town of Tully has received a legal challenge to our "moratorium on development within the watershed" during the update of our Comprehensive plan . We have engaged our legal team and will keep you abreast of any developments.

Lastly, we have received numerous complaints about the "timeliness" of the "Tully News" letter delivery. We are looking into the situation and hope to correct in the next cycle.

Honeywell Property - Fellows Falls

We started out as a small group of neighbors interested in the future of Fellows Falls. During our fact finding, considerable time was spent reading and interpreting documents in conversations with DEC, US Fish and Wildlife and the Onondaga Nation, and touring the Fellows Falls property.

In March 2019 we believed that the DEC would become the stewards of the 1023 acres, but all that changed recently with the announcement by the Trustees granting title of the land to the Onondaga Nation.

The Onondaga Nation has expressed a strong willingness to work with the community to create access to Fellows Falls, in the least obtrusive way, while preserving ecologically sensitive areas - not an easy task. Fellows Falls is situated between Tully Farms Road and Woodmancy Road, and is but a sliver of the 1023 acres. (Until Title legally moves to the Onondaga Nation, it is still Honeywell property and access is restricted.)

Our current goal is to have us all gather to share information, ask questions and understand what's possible. This will include Onondaga Nation, USFW, DEC, Tully Town Board, Honeywell and you! As soon as a date has been agreed upon by all involved, we will let you know. Concerned Citizens for Fellows Falls

Fire Prevention Week Oct 9-15



"Fire Won't Wait. Plan Your Escape"

Today's homes burn faster and hotter than they used to, minimizing the amount of time you have to escape safely. In a typical home fire, you may have as little as two minutes to get out from the time the smoke alarm sounds.

- Make sure your home escape plan meets the needs of all your family members, including those with sensory or physical disabilities.
- Smoke alarms should be installed inside every sleeping room, outside each separate sleeping area, and on every level of your home. Smoke alarms should be interconnected so when one sounds, they all sound.
- Know at least two ways out of every room, if possible.
 Make sure all doors and windows open easily.
- Have an outside meeting place a safe distance from your home where everyone should meet.
- Practice your home fire drill at least twice a year with everyone in the household, including guests. Practice at least once during the day and at night.
